







The FLOW




SECTION FIVE: 12 Disciplines








12 DISCIPLINES: Here are some heart exercises for you...
These discipleship "disciplines" can help Christians to strengthen their faith and grow as missional & maturing Christ-followers.





DEVELOPMENT:

As Christians commit to life-long knowing, growing, & going, both the individual Christian, AND the global Church will continue to deploy & develop...

Growth honors God.

2 Timothy 3:16-17

All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for rebuking, for correction, and for training in righteousness, <u>17</u>so that the man of God may be complete, thoroughly equipped for every good work.

INTRO:

Welcome to another major transition point in your discipleship journey and our Come And See Christianity curriculum. By way of review, thus far, we have gone through Section One's single lesson on God's divine DESIGN, then Section Two's three unifying and introductory lessons on every human's 3 DIVISIONS (our HEAD, HEART, and HANDS); we then followed up with the universally inclusive definitions and descriptions of humanity's 5 types of people, also known as biblical DISCIPLES (the LOST, LOVER, LEARNER, LEADER, and LIFER), each having received their own lesson. Next came what we just completed, Section Four's 7 lessons on Christianity's fundamental, knowledge-based truths, also known as The DETAILS (FOUNDATIONS, FRAMEWORK, FACTS, FIGHT, FAITH, FAMILY, and FOREVER).

Now, in the same way that Sections 1-4 (and their 16 compiled lessons) all concentrated on aspects of "The HEAD" and the truth of God's Word, Section 5 will contain 12 complementary lessons (J.E.S.U.S.'S. P.S.W.O.R.D.) that focus on HEART exercises, also known as spiritual DISCIPLINES, that can help to grow and strengthen the Christian's truth-filled, loving, and faithfully obedient HEART...

Spiritual Disciplines

(The content herein is predominantly derived and expanded upon from Dr. Don Whitney's *Spiritual Disciplines* & Dr. Chuck Lawless' *Discipled Warriors*.)

I. SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINES . . . FOR THE PURPOSE OF GODLINESS

Ours is an undisciplined age. The old disciplines are breaking down.
... We <u>need</u> the rugged strength of Christian <u>character</u>
that can come only from discipline.

Discipline without direction is drudgery!

The Bible says of God's elect, "For those whom He foreknew He also predestined <u>to be conformed</u> to the image of His Son" (Romans 8:29)

Although God will grant Christlikeness to us when Jesus returns, until then He intends for us to grow toward it.

We aren't merely to wait for holiness; we're to pursue it.

All who come to God trusting in the person and work of Jesus to make them right with God are given the Holy Spirit (see Ephesians 1:13-14). The presence of the Holy Spirit causes all those in whom He resides to have new holy hungers they didn't have before.

Hebrews 12:14 is clear: <u>Anyone</u> who is not striving for holiness will not see the Lord!

The urgent question every Christian should ask is, "How then shall I pursue holiness... How can I become more like Christ?" God's Word offers a clear answer in...

<u>1 Timothy 4:7</u> "Discipline yourself for the purpose of godliness."

The only road to Christian maturity and godliness (a.k.a. Christlikeness & holiness) passes through the practice of the Spiritual Disciplines.

Godliness is the goal of the Disciplines... remember this and the **Spiritual <u>Disciplines become delights vs drudgery</u>.**

II. WHAT ARE SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINES?

Spiritual Disciplines are those practices found in Scripture (and in application) that promote spiritual growth among believers in The Gospel.

Spiritual Disciplines are the **habits of devotion** and **experiential Christianity** that have been **practiced** by the people of God since biblical times.

The Disciplines could be described in several ways:

- "First, the Bible prescribes both personal and interpersonal Spiritual Disciplines."
- Spiritual Disciplines are activities, NOT attitudes.
 - Disciplines are practices... NOT character qualities, graces, or "fruit of the Spirit" (Galatians 5:22-23).
 - Disciplines are things you do!

The goal of practicing a given Discipline, is not about "DOing" as much as it is about "BEing," that is, BEing like Jesus. But the biblical way to grow in BEing more like Jesus is through the rightly motivated doing of the biblical Spiritual Disciplines.

- We do specific practices *sometimes* that cultivate being more like Jesus *all the time*.
- > Spiritual Disciplines are practices taught or modeled in the Bible. (Without this limitation, we might call anything we fancy a Spiritual Discipline.)
- > Spiritual Disciplines found in Scripture are sufficient for knowing & experiencing God & growing in Christlikeness.
 - o See 2 Timothy 3:16-17
 - o See 2 Peter 1:3 & Philippians 4:13
- > Spiritual Disciplines are practices <u>derived</u> from the gospel, NOT <u>divorced</u> from the gospel.
- > Spiritual Disciplines are means, not ends.

Godliness is both closeness to Christ and conformity to Christ.

CAUTION: While we cannot be godly without the practice of the Disciplines, we can practice the Disciplines without being godly...

So, the Spiritual Disciplines are those personal and interpersonal activities given by God in the Bible as the sufficient means believers in Jesus Christ are to use in the Spirit-filled, gospel-driven pursuit of godliness, that is, closeness to Christ and conformity to Christ.

III. SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINES... AS MEANS TO GODLINESS

Godliness comes through discipline.

God uses three primary catalysts for changing us and conforming us into Christlikeness, but only one is largely under our control.

#1: God uses people to change people.

- "Iron sharpens iron," says Proverbs 27:17.
- Sometimes God uses our friends to sharpen us into more Christlike living, and sometimes He uses our enemies to file away our rough, ungodly edges.

#2: God uses circumstance(s) as His catalyst for change.

#3: God uses spiritual disciplines to change His people.

God uses spiritual disciplines to work on His people from the **inside out**.

Colossians 1:29 illustrates how **the efforts of a Christian & the work of God—can occur simultaneously** in a person indwelled by the Holy Spirit (cf. Philippians 2:13).

See here divine grace AND human responsibility...

As physical disciplines promote bodily strength, so the Spiritual Disciplines promote godliness.

Think of the Spiritual Disciplines as ways by which we can spiritually place ourselves in the path of God's grace and seek Him, much **like Zacchaeus** placed himself physically in Jesus' path and sought Him. The Lord, by His Spirit, still travels down certain paths that He has ordained and revealed in Scripture. We call these paths the Spiritual Disciplines...

If we will place ourselves on these paths and look for Him there by faith, we can expect to encounter Him.

IV. SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINES... GOD'S WILL FOR CHRISTIANS

"Discipline yourself for the purpose of godliness" makes it plain that **this is a command of God**, not merely a suggestion.

- ➤ Holiness is not an option for those who claim to be children of the Holy One (see 1 Peter 1:15-16), so neither are the means of holiness—that is, the Spiritual Disciplines—an option.
- ➤ Jesus is the model of discipline in & for godliness.
- Many professing Christians are spiritually undisciplined and seem to have little Christlike fruit and power in their lives. Yet, many of them are remarkably disciplined in other areas of their lives.
- ➤ Too many Christians trivialize their effectiveness for the kingdom of God through a lack of discipline.
- ➤ The danger of neglecting the Spiritual Disciplines is the danger of bearing little spiritual fruit—your life counting little for the sake of the kingdom.

By means of the Disciplines, let the truths of The Gospel restore your soul.

Christian DEVELOPMENT is biblical SANCTIFICATION.

We believe that the work of regeneration, conversion, <u>sanctification</u>, and faith, is not an act of man's free will and power, but of the mighty, efficacious and irresistible grace of God.

Message

DEVELOPMENT, by definition, is a dynamic and shaping reality. Think about it, when an individual or group of people are "developing," they are changing... for better or for worse. To help frame this concept and lesson, it may be beneficial to realize that *the opposite of DEVELOPMENT is inertia, regression, and/or simply the maintaining of the status quo.*

Dictionary.com defines DEVELOPMENT as "the act or process of growth; progress." Consequently, it is important to realize that people can "develop" things like cancer, bad habits, unhealthy relationships, and a tragic array of sinful possibilities. Thus, **growth is not always good**. Sadly, some of DEVELOPMENT's definition grieves God, hurts people, and, when it happens under the professing banner of Christianity, is bad (see the Parable of The Soils in Matthew 13:1-13, the regressive DEVELOPMENT of Demas that the Apostle Paul warned of in 2 Timothy 4:10, and the shocking shortfall of the Rich Young Ruler's DEVELOPMENT & defining downfall, as shared in Luke 18:18-30).

Having here noted the reader's steadfast need for shrewd discernment and full context definitions regarding DEVELOPMENT (1 Timothy 4:16), the lesson at hand will focus on the biblical, personal, and missional aspects of spiritual growth, otherwise known as discipleship and SANCTIFICATION.

In short, when a Christian's DEVELOPMENT includes learning, loving, and living God's Word, will, and ways, their HEAD, HEART, and HANDS will be sanctified as they are discipled and experience progressive, miraculous transformation (2 Corinthians 5:17).

What is Sanctification?

Sanctification is one of those religious-sounding words that people in the church use, but may not understand what it means. In its most basic sense, to sanctify something is to set it apart for God's special use and purpose. Therefore, God's people are sometimes said to be sanctified because they are set apart for God's special purposes in the world: "Consecrate yourselves, therefore, and be holy; for I am the LORD your God. Keep my statutes, and do them; I am the LORD who sanctifies you" (Leviticus 20:7-8).

As this verse helps us see, the word sanctification is closely related to holiness. The word sanctification can be used similarly in the New Testament. Thus in one sense, believers are already sanctified because of what Jesus has done for them. Hebrews 10:10 tells us that as followers of Christ "we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all."

But most of the time when Christians use the word sanctification, they are referring to the progressive work of God to make a believer more like Jesus Christ. As such Paul can write, "For this is the will of God, your sanctification: that you abstain from sexual immorality" (1 Thess. 4:3). He commands Christians to "present your members as slaves to righteousness leading to sanctification" (Rom 6:19). Because believers have been set free from their slavery to sin, "the fruit you get leads to sanctification and its end, eternal life" (Romans 6:22).

In sanctification, both God and the Christian have specific responsibilities. Paul commands believers to "work out your own salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who works in you, both to will and to work for his good pleasure" (Philippians 2:12-13). God is the one who does the work of making us more like Christ, and we participate in that work by a life of continually turning away from sin and demonstrating our faith in Christ by obeying God's commands. The Holy Spirit plays a key role in this process; as we walk in the power of the Spirit we "will not gratify the desires of the flesh" (Galatians 5:16).

In addition to empowering us by his Spirit, God has given us other tools to grow when asking what is sanctification. Reading, studying, and being taught the Bible enables us to better understand who God is, what he has done for us, and how he calls us to live. Praying expresses our faith in the sovereign power of God to accomplish what only he can do. Fellowship with other believers encourages us to put our faith into practice by loving and bearing with one another. Giving weans our hearts off putting our trust in the fleeting things of this world and shows that we value the work of God even more than our own comfort. Sharing the gospel with others brings us the joy of participating in God's work of extending his kingdom. All of these are different tools that God uses to make us more like Jesus.

As believers, our hope is fixed on the day when Jesus returns. But in the meantime, we are called to pursue our sanctification in anticipation of that day. John explains how these two realities relate to each other: "See what kind of love the Father has given to us, that we should be called children of God; and so we are. The reason why the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is. And everyone who thus hopes in him purifies himself as he is pure" (1 John 3:1-3).

Because of what God has done for us in Jesus, we have already been set apart for his special purposes. What is sanctification? By the power of God's Spirit we pursue growing in godliness so that we more clearly reflect Jesus Christ in our lives. We do so in anticipation of the day when Christ will return and complete the process of sanctification by making us perfect reflections of Christ.

And she went up to him and said, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to serve alone? Tell her then to help me." 41But the Lord answered her, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and troubled about many things, 42but one thing is necessary. Mary has chosen the good portion, which will not be taken away from her."

1. DEVOTED Development

Illustration:

"Sanctification grows out of faith in Jesus Christ. Remember, holiness is a flower, not a root. It is not sanctification that saves, but salvation that sanctifies."

Explanation:

Biblical devotion and DEVELOPMENT are both grounded in the "truth in love" (Ephesians 4:15) of God-honoring priorities and passions.

It may surprise you to learn that our lesson on knowing, growing and going in *Christian DEVELOPMENT will concentrate on one thing.* In fact, we will steer clear of multi-tasking to-do lists all together. Instead, just as Jesus told and taught the task-oriented, hard-working Martha in our text, **pleasing and glorifying God really comes down to ONE THING.**

Our LORD said it this way in the Old and New Testament:

(Deuteronomy 6:5 & Mark 12:30) "Love the LORD your God with ALL your heart, soul, mind, and strength."

ALL-in devotion + sanctifying discipleship = Christian DEVELOPMENT!

Jesus was repeatedly emphatic in His teaching and preaching... "Seek first the kingdom of God" (Matthew 6:33). Every aspect of Christian DEVELOPMENT and SANCTIFICATION is the fruit of this ONE THING... a faithful and increasing intimacy with Almighty God – His name is Jesus!

Regardless of who the person is, where they live, or what stage of maturity they represent, their fullest blessings and next stage of spiritual DEVELOPMENT await them on the other side of more SANCTIFICATION. The more we love, know, and grow in Christ and Christ-likeness, the greater our spiritual growth – the greater our ability and opportunities to glorify God.

Never forget Augustine's famously practical and theologically thick words of wisdom: "Love the LORD your God with ALL your heart, soul, mind, and strength... then go do whatever you want." These words should be treated as light (Psalm 119:105) and treasure (Matthew 6:21). With that said, be sure to hear and heed Augustine's preconditions before wrongly engaging the license and liberties he so boldly offers.

Application:

Saving faith is an immediate relation to Christ, accepting, receiving, resting upon Him alone, for justification, sanctification, and eternal life by virtue of God's grace.

2. DISTRACTED Development

Illustration:

"What do you want?"
- Jesus Christ

"Till sin be bitter, Christ will not be sweet."

Explanation:

As noted earlier, DEVELOPMENT without guardrails runs the risk of going in the wrong direction. Like weeds in a garden, some unwanted things grow all by themselves... no fertilizer required.

Regarding Christian DEVELOPMENT, it is important to realize that <u>distractions are dangerous</u>. Stated positively, *spiritual growth and* biblical SANCTIFICATION tend to thrive when they combine personal integrity, faithfully focused intensity, and missional intentionality.

By contrast, unfortunately, most things that develop as a byproduct of distractions undermine noble goals. You will never bump into your best unexpectedly... Think about it. **Excellence is no coincidence!** Case in point, when it comes to growing as a God-honoring, worshipful witness of Christ, **winging it won't work!** Consequently, Christianity calls for concentrated and concerted efforts to be intentional about DEVELOPMENT.

All of Scripture, and the New Testament book of Hebrews in particular, exemplifies this lesson's call for missional intentionality. Consider the catastrophic consequences of being spiritually lukewarm or lackadaisical...

Developmental drifting leads to missional distractions...

Distractions tend to lead to inner disgruntled-ness...

Disgruntled-ness often leads to secret disobedience...

Disobedience always leads to vertical & horizontal division...

Division, by definition, leads to dysfunction in God's family...

Dysfunction leads misguided people into spiritual darkness...

Darkness leads to the Devil's hidden traps & troublemakers...

The Devil & the demonic lead to eternal death & destruction.

In Martha's case (Luke 10:38-42), we have a classic display of the dangers hidden behind biblical distractions. Let us learn from the contrasting intentionality of Mary and Martha. Look closely and you will see, as Jesus corrected and then rebuked the self-righteous sister (Martha) for being "distracted," her posture and replies have much to teach us.

Martha was distracted (Luke 10:40)...

Martha then became disruptive...

Martha grew to be dismissive of Jesus...

Martha went on to become disgruntled...

Martha ended up disrespecting Jesus...

Authentic Christian DEVELOPMENT should always be rooted in worship... and fruited with works.

Application:

"Lose your life and you will save it. 3. DISCIPLESHIP Development

Tell me not of your justification, unless you have also some marks of sanctification. Boast not of Christ's work for you, unless you can show us the Spirit's work in you.



Explanation:


All genuine, Christian DEVELOPMENT is grounded in God's grace, grown by His sanctifying Spirit, and aiming at intimacy... for His glory!

Therefore, we can say without hesitation or reservation that all Gospel centered and God-honoring discipleship should share the following core characteristics.


- 1. Per 2 Timothy 3:16-17, God's Word, will, & ways are always authoritative.
- 2. "Truth in love" (Ephesians 4:15) is to always be the promise and answer...
- 3. Christ's Gospel always anchors ALL aspects of Christian DEVELOPMENT.
- 4. A biblical definition & understanding of DISCIPLESHIP is always essential.



5. Christian DEVELOPMENT should always be holistic in aim & application.



6. The same biblical principles should always apply to every disciple...



Application:

2 Timothy 2:1-7

1You then, my child, be strengthened by the grace that is in Christ Jesus, 2and what you have heard from me in the presence of many witnesses entrust to faithful men, who will be able to teach others also. 3Share in suffering as a good soldier of Christ Jesus. 4No soldier gets entangled in civilian pursuits, since his aim is to please the one who enlisted him. 5An athlete is not crowned unless he competes according to the rules. 6It is the hard-working farmer who ought to have the first share of the crops. 7Think over what I say, for the Lord will give you understanding in everything.
