

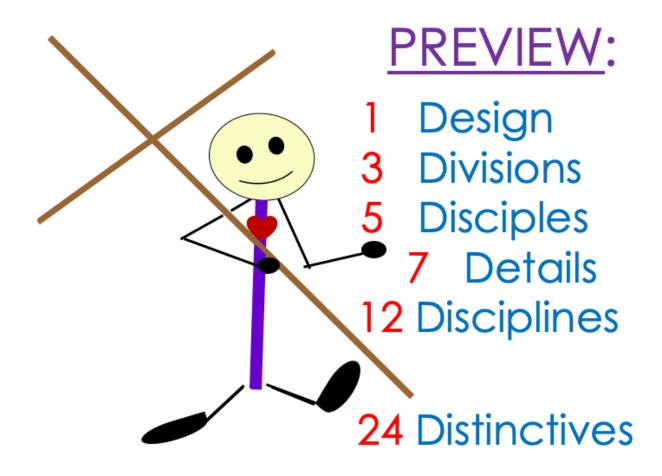






The Disciple's "Hands" put into action the truth & love of God's Word, God's will, & God's ways.

### **CONTEXT:**

Macro

This lesson marks another major transition point in our curriculum's eye-opening explanation of Christianity. By way of review, we began in Section One with the reality of Almighty God having 1 Divine DESIGN (also known as a biblical worldview and the eternal application of Jesus Christ's Gospel). In Section Two, we addressed the 3 DIVISIONS (Head, Heart, and Hands) that make up the "being" in every human being. Next, in Section Three, we demonstrated how Christianity accounts for, defines, and describes all of humanity, every person, past, present, and future. We noted that all people can be identified as one of the 5 DISCIPLES – Lost, Lover, Learner, Leader, or Lifer. Moving forward, Section Four revealed, engaged, and explained the 7 fundamental DETAILS of God's Divine DESIGN... because we all need to know what we need to know. To be more specific, those seven truths are: The Foundations, The Framework, The Facts, The Fight, The Faith, The Family, and the truth about Forever.

Then, in Section Five, which we just completed, our focus shifted from HEAD based truths to 12 HEART shaping exercises or disciplines - each having the potential to strengthen one's personal relationship with Christ, His Church, and their collective mission: <u>bringing God glory by finding & growing more glorifiers.</u>

We used the acronym J.E.S.U.S.'S. P. S.W.O.R.D. to outline and harmonize a biblical, missional, and intentional methodology for growing in God's love - & His loving witness. The 12 HEART DISCIPLINES are: Journaling... Eating-nothing (fasting)... Scripture-intake... Understudy of Scripture... Stewardship... Solitude... Prayer... Serving... Worshipping... Outreach... Relationships... and Development.

Now, our curriculum and study will transition to The HANDS. This is where *Christians demonstrate to the world that Christ is in their worship & witness.* Whereas our time spent in the HEAD sections (1-4) focused on the truths that Christians need and seek to LEARN, and our concentration on the 12 HEART DISCIPLINES of section 5 helped us to grow in God's LOVE, our sixth and final section will walk through the 24 DISTINCTIVES, which explain & exemplify how Christians are to faithfully LIVE... and fully BE The Church... together – all by God's grace & ALL for His glory!

God's Word puts it this way:

"Let us not love with word and tongue but in action and truth." –  $1^{st}$  John 3:18

And day by day, attending the temple together and breaking bread in their homes, they received their food with glad and generous hearts, 47 praising God and having favor with all the people. And the Lord added to their number day by day those who were being saved. – Acts 2:46-47

### I. DISTINCTIVES are FRUIT:

It is important to realize that God's miraculous and authentic **Christian DISTINCTIVES** are the FRUIT of saving grace and faith (Ephesians 2:1-10). As Jesus described in John 15, people can do nothing outside of their abiding in Him and obeying His Word, will and ways. In short, there will be no fruit unless one remains attached to and provided for by the true Vine and divine Root. With that said, a cautionary note is worth sharing here, beware the counterfeits that abound around the world. **Plastic fruit is deceptive vs. DISTINCTIVE!** 

### **Galatians 5:22-25**

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, 23 gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law. 24 And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires.

25 If we live by the Spirit, let us also keep in step with the Spirit.

### II. DISTINCTIVES are FAMILY:



DISTINCTIVES, by definition, are those "distinguishing characteristics that are notable for having a special quality, style, and/or attractiveness" (Dictionary.com).

When it comes to God's family, the true Church, each Christian and their individualistic DISTINCTIVES are as unique as their potential. At the same time, in the same way that a billion unique snowflakes can be combined to make a single snowstorm, or countless swatches of scrap fabric can be sewn together to make a single quilt, so it is with God's family. The LORD creates His Christian family with a both/and combination of DISTINCTIVE uniqueness, as well as DISTINCTIVE love and defining unity.

# Christianity's DISTINCT family (ecclesia) has a DISTINCTIVE unity (koinonia).

### III. DISTINCTIVES are WITNESS:

The most biblical and healthy understandings of Christianity will include an embrace of two overarching and DISTINCTIVE purposes. Namely, per God's Word, will, and ways, every Christian has received miraculous, saving grace, as well as the indwelling presence and power of the Holy Spirit, to:

### 1. Bring glory to God.

### 1 Corinthians 10:31

So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God.

### 2. BE Christ's witness.

### **Acts 1:8**

But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, **and you will be My witnesses** in Jerusalem (locally), and in all Judea and Samaria (regionally), and to the end of the earth (globally)."

God's DISTINCTIVE people have been filled with His Holy Spirit for the express purpose of living DISTINCTIVE lives. When the world sees the LORD's loving family living out their divinely empowered and God-honoring worship, work, and warfare, the resulting fruit will serve as a faithful witness, built with supernatural, grace-based, and missional DISTINCTIVES.

### The Christian Distinctive

What distinguishes Christianity from all other religions is that it is a *revealed* religion. Christianity is not about our search for God or our means of finding him. Christianity is not a religion that works its way upward. It is all about God coming to us — God in grace making himself known to us and making a way for us to enjoy fellowship with him.

And so, at the very heart of Christianity is, simply, a message — a message from God to us about what he has done to bring us to himself.

If Christianity is distinctively revealed religion, then it is also uniquely *authoritative*. It does not offer itself as the best and highest of human thinking about God or even the best or most successful of human efforts to know God. It professes to be nothing less than the unique word from God, his very own self-disclosure and the record of the actions he has taken in Jesus Christ to bring us into fellowship with himself.

One of Rudyard Kipling's characters declares, "The heathen in his blindness bows down to wood and stone; He don't obey no orders unless they is his own." That is to say, human religions lack authority — they form their own ideas and "discover" their own beliefs.

By contrast the Christian is "under orders," because unlike human religions, Christianity is a revealed religion — divinely revealed. We Christians are not our own touchstone of truth, and we do not confuse our ideas about God with His own self-revelation. We learn truth about God not from "inner lights" within ourselves but from God's own objective Word.

And apart from this external authority, there is no Christianity. This, at bottom, is Christianity's leading distinctive.

And so, we Christians prize Scripture as God's Word. We joyfully submit to it. And we enthusiastically proclaim its message of grace in Jesus Christ to the world.

Message

### What does it mean to love one another?

In John 13:34 Jesus taught, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." Then He added, "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another" (verse 35). How do we do this?

The "one another" in these verses is a reference to fellow believers. A distinguishing mark of being a follower of Christ is a deep, sincere love for brothers and sisters in Christ. The apostle John reminds us of this fact elsewhere: "He has given us this command: Anyone who loves God must also love their brother and sister" (1 John 4:21).

In giving this command, **Jesus did something the world had never seen before—He created a group identified by one thing: love.** There are many groups in the world, and they identify themselves in any number of ways: by skin color, by uniform, by shared interest, by alma mater, etc. One group has tattoos and piercings; another group abstains from meat... the ways people categorize themselves are endless. But **the church is unique.** For the first and only time in history, Jesus created a group whose identifying factor is love. Skin color doesn't matter. Native language doesn't matter. There are no rules about diet or uniforms or wearing funny hats. Followers of Christ are identified by their love for each other.

The early church demonstrated the type of love Jesus was talking about. There were people in Jerusalem from all over the known world (<u>Acts 2:9–11</u>). Those who were saved got together and immediately began meeting each other's needs: "All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need" (<u>Acts 2:44–45</u>). This was love in action, and you can be sure it made an impression on the people of that city.

Jesus' statements in John 13:34–35 raise a couple of other questions that may be good to answer. First, how does Jesus love? He loves unconditionally (Romans 5:8), sacrificially

(<u>2 Corinthians 5:21</u>), with forgiveness (<u>Ephesians 4:32</u>), and eternally (<u>Romans 8:38–39</u>). At the same time, Jesus' love is holy—characterized by transcendent moral purity—because He is holy (<u>Hebrews 7:26</u>). The culmination of Christ's amazing love for us is His death on the cross, burial, and bodily resurrection (<u>1 John 4:9–10</u>). Believers are to love each other like that.

Second, how then can the believer in Christ love as Christ loved? The believer in Christ has the Holy Spirit living within him (1 Corinthians 6:19–20). By obeying the Spirit, through the Word of God, the believer can love like Christ does. He shows that unconditional, sacrificial, forgiving love to fellow believers, but it doesn't stop there. He also shows the love of Christ to friends, to family members, to coworkers, etc. (Ephesians 5:18–6:4; Galatians 5:16, 22–23). Even enemies are the recipients of Christ's love (see Matthew 5:43–48).

Christ's love displayed through the believer is unlike the "love" generated by the flesh, which can be selfish, egotistical, unforgiving, and insincere. First Corinthians 13:4–8 gives a wonderful description of what Christ's love will be like in and through the believer who walks in the Spirit.

**People don't naturally love with a <u>1 Corinthians 13</u>-type love. To love like that, there must be a change of heart.** A person must realize that he is a sinner before God and understand that Christ died on the cross and rose again to provide him forgiveness; then he must make the decision to accept Christ as his personal Savior. At that point he is forgiven by Christ and receives God's gift of eternal life—in fact, he becomes a participant in the divine nature (<u>2 Peter 1:4</u>). **In Christ he knows that he is genuinely loved by God. The new life the believer receives includes a new capacity to love like Christ loves**, for the believer now has living within him the unconditional, sacrificial, forgiving, eternal, and holy love of God (<u>Romans 5:5</u>).

To love one another is to love fellow believers as Christ loves us. Those who love like Christ in the Holy Spirit's power will give evidence that they are disciples... of Jesus Christ.

### Explanation:


By definition, "TRULY" means, in a broad context, factual, legitimate, representing truth, genuinely, honestly, really, rightly, properly, exactly, etc. In short, **TRULY is TRUTH's core character. It is TRUTH in Christ-like application.** 

By contrast, the opposite of TRULY is falsely, deceptive, disingenuous, misguided, fake, hypocritical, manipulative, lying, etc. One can quickly see that **TRUTH and TRULY have enemies!** 

Think about it... only when one realizes that Jesus IS Truth (John 14:6) and every syllable of Scripture, His Word, The Bible, is TRULY God-breathed and divinely-inspired (2 Timothy 3:16-17) can the weight and importance of trustworthy TRUTH being TRULY represented begin to receive its proper respect and appreciation.

God's enemies know that His TRUTH threatens to expose their lies. Consequently, in spiritual, emotional, and cultural arenas, there is a war underway for the hearts, minds, perceptions, and priorities of individuals, as well as the largest collections of cohesive people and diverse people-groups.

Sadly, as the folks at "Answers In Genesis" have so aptly depicted below, much, if not the vast majority of the professing Christian church, lives distracted, deceived, and openly destructive lives, largely due to their lack of commitment to God's TRUTH and TRULY Christ-like, biblical and missional LOVING of ONE ANOTHER. Sometimes a picture really is worth 1,000 words.

### Explanation:

As noted above and throughout the Holy Scriptures, *true Christian love is selfless, relational, AND born out of the love of God* (see 1<sup>st</sup> John 4:16 and John 3:16). Any other form or claim of love will fall somewhere on the spectrum of lies between lust and like. By contrast, from its heartbeating inception and authentic infancy, through its developing childhood, strengthening adolescence, and ever-maturing adulthood, the Christian love that unites, defines, and displays Christianity is always a triumph of Truth.

With that said, it is important to recognize that *God's love and the love of God's people are both beyond counter-cultural, they are culture-condemning.* Reader BE ready! To be forewarned is to be forearmed. Think about it... As the old song's title famously declares: *"Love Is A Battlefield."* By embracing and exemplifying biblical love's Author and authority, the Christian's definition and descriptions of love and loving challenge and convict those who champion culture's lies and lusts.

In the context of Christians TRULY LOVING ONE ANOTHER, we will always be well served by remembering to come under three defining pillars of Christianity's God-honoring, God-sourcing, and God-glorifying love.

1. Love is COMMANDED

2. Love is COMMISSIONED

3. Love is COMMITMENT



### Explanation:

There are 100+ "one another" references in the Bible. In each and every case, there is a direct and/or indirect connection to the family of God... the biblical Church. With that said, we ALL need to know who the ONE ANOTHER are, as described by God and His Word.

There are two Greek words in the Bible's New Testament that offer us the definitions that we need. The first word, "ecclesia," is obvious. The second word, "koinonia," is equally insightful, while being substantially more subtle. Ecclesia is the Greek word for what is translated "church" in the English Bible. Herein, we have the most straight forward and succinct definition of God's "one anothers." Per the Scriptures, it is really this simple... the true Church is the true people. To say it another way, take it to heart, the true Church is the true "one anothers."

The biblical, missional, and cultural importance of this lesson extends beyond the obvious pleasantries of sharing in loving relationships... Per God's Word, will, and ways, there are also extensive and even eternal dangers that come into focus... Why? Because spiritual warfare is real (Ephesians 6). Moreover, there are goats and wolves in the "visible church," intermingling with and seeking to destroy Christ's sheep, sheep-dogs, & under-shepherds.



The second Greek word, "koinonia," is translated as "fellowship" in Acts 2, where its full context definition is found in the supernatural unity that describes the true, ("invisible") Church. Here again we can see how God's Word, will, & ways always harmonize. In short, *koinonia unifies the one anothers.* From the other side, sin and Satan motivate and unite the enemies of God who seek to penetrate and poison the true faith family's fellowship... the koinonia that helps to define and describe Christ's true one anothers.

There is a Christian failure to distinguish between socializing and fellowship. Although socializing is often both a part of and the context of fellowship, it is possible to socialize without having fellowship. Socializing involves the sharing of human and earthly life. Christian fellowship, New Testament koinonia, involves the sharing of spiritual life. Don't misunderstand- socializing is a valuable asset to the church and necessary for a healthy life. But we have gone beyond giving socializing the place it deserves. We have become willing to accept it as a substitute for fellowship, almost cheating ourselves of the Christian birthright of true fellowship altogether.

Christian "koinonia" exists between everyone who knows God through Jesus Christ (see 1 John 1:3). Everyone united with Christ by faith is also united with everyone else united with Christ. The same Holy Spirit indwells all believers and gives each a common share in the body of Christ, the church. As the apostle Paul put it, "For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body...and all have been made to drink into one Spirit" (1 Corinthians 12:13).

### Application:

Nowhere in the New Testament do any of the Greek words translated "fellowship" imply fun times. Rather, they talk of, for example, "The fellowship of the ministering to the saints" (2 Cor. 8:4) as sacrificial service and financial aid (see for example, 1 Tim. 6:18). Elsewhere, Paul was thankful for the Philippian believers' "fellowship in the gospel" (Phil. 1:5), for he knew that "inasmuch as both in my bonds, and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel, ye all are partakers (same word as fellowship) of my grace" (Phil. 1:7). This sort of fellowship may even bring persecution. We are to emulate Christ's humility and self-sacrificial love (Phil. 2:5-8) through the "fellowship of the Spirit" (Phil. 2:1). In some way known only partially to us, we have the privilege of knowing "the fellowship of His sufferings, being made conformable unto His death" (Phil. 3:10), and even the communion (i.e. fellowship) of the blood.... and body of Christ" (1 Cor. 10:16)
